Purpose of the Report

The report advises Members of an application for a club premises certificate to be granted under the Licensing Act 2003, made by The Committee of Marden Cricket and Hockey Club, in respect of the premises Marden Cricket and Hockey Club, Maidstone Road, Marden, Kent, TN12 9AG, (Appendix B) in respect of which 4 objections have been received from other parties (Appendix C).

Issue to be Decided

- 1. Members are asked to determine whether to:
 - grant as applied for with conditions consistent with the club operating schedule and mandatory conditions
 - 2) grant as above subject to modified conditions as considered appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
 - 3) exclude any qualifying club activity to which the application relates
 - 4) or reject the application

Background

- 2 The relevant sections are Part 4 S71 -79 of The Licensing Act 2003 and section 4 of The Licensing Act 2003 in particular the Licensing Objectives:
- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- Public Safety
- The prevention of public nuisance; and
- The protection of children from harm
- 3. The application has been correctly advertised in the local press and notices displayed at the premises for the required period.
- 4. There are no representations received from responsible authorities.
- 5. There are 4remaining representations from other parties.

The objections are that the granting of a club premise certificate for the hours requested would impact considerably on nearby residents and cause additional noise pollution. Also the requested hours will lead to excessive drinking and disorderly behaviour which will also affect residents in the vicinity. Other parties have requested that the hours of the club are reduced to be in line with other premises in the Village and have named the following. premises:-

The table shows that there are premises in the area that have hours in place similar to the hours requested by The Committee of Marden Cricket and Hockey Club.

9. Members are advised that applications cannot be refused in whole or in part, or conditions attached to the licence unless it is appropriate to do so to promote the licensing objectives.;

10. The Club Operating Schedule submitted by the Applicant has addressed the licensing objectives in the following manner:

a) General – all four licensing objectives:

The Club is a members only club, with access restricted to members and their guests and not open to the general public.

Premises are fully secured and alarmed to protect stock of alcohol.

Staff are trained not to serve inebriated or abusive customers.

Premises have no immediate neighbours and opportunities to cause a public nuisance are limited.

Minors are permitted in the bar area, staff trained in Challenge 18 protocol.

All staff are DBS checked through either the England Hockey or England Cricket Board system.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder:

Premises are fully secured and alarmed to protect stock of alcohol.

CCTV in operation.

Cash secured in safe or off premises.

Those already inebriated are refused alcohol.

c) Public Safety:

The Club is not open to the public, only to members and their guests and therefore public safety is not an issue.

Hirer's of the facilities, visiting sports teams and their supporters are considered to be guests of the club.

d) The prevention of public nuisance:

The location of the premises on the edge of the village reduces the risk of any public nuisance

Vehicles leaving the premises don't exit onto residential roads, no immediate neighbours. CCTV and security measures in place to prevent theft and vandalism.

e) The Protection of children from harm:

Over 40 members of the Club are DBS checked, including the bar staff and General Manager.

Minors are permitted in the bar area and the appropriate safety measures are taken. The staff operate Challenge 18.

All recommendations from England Hockey, the England Cricket Board and the Lawn Tennis Association with regards to child protection are incorporated into the Club's policies.

On the 26th April 2018 the applicant responded to the objections received (Appendix E). They offered amended hours and gave information to clarify some of the points raised by the other parties. Please see table

On the 13.5.2018 an other party responded to the applicants offer and maintained that they continued to wish the licence to be restricted to an end time of 23:00 7 days a week and would not withdraw their representation (Appendix F).

On the 14.05.2018 the applicant responded to the other parties further reducing the hours on the proviso they had their 8 occasions per year (Appendix G), see table.

On the 18.05.18 one other party withdrew their representation on the basis that the hours offered on the 14.05.18 would be applied. There has been no contact from any of the other parties in response to the proposed amended hours of 14.05.18.

Relevant policy statements contained in the Licensing Authority's Statement of Licensing Policy:

13.1 - 13.8 Club Premises Certificates

The Licensing Authority acknowledges the importance and history of members clubs and the privileged position held by clubs historically in relation to alcohol licensing.

Members clubs are able to obtain a club premises certificate to authorise licensable activities for their members and their guests. There is no requirement for any members to hold a personal licence under the Licensing Act 2003, and there is no requirement to specify a designated premises supervisor. It is acknowledged that alcohol is supplied by and for the members through their membership of the club.

In order to apply for a club premises certificate the Licensing Authority must be satisfied that the club is a qualifying club and satisfies the legal conditions set out in the Act. Applicants for a club premises certificate will be required to complete a club declaration form setting out how the club will meet the conditions and definitions stated in the Act. Licensing officers will have delegated authority to make additional enquiries where appropriate in order to satisfy that a proposed club meets the criteria laid out in the Act.

The fundamental principles for premises licence applications set out at section 15 of this Policy will apply to applications for club premises certificates subject to exemptions in respect of the DPS and the requirement for evidence of the club's status.

Any qualifying club wishing to offer licensable activities at events to which non-members will attend will be required to authorise such activities by way of a Temporary Event Notice or by ensuring compliance with the club rules to allow the public to enjoy the clubs facilities and activities without jeopardising the validity of the club premises certificate.

The Licensing Authority expects 'public' events on club premises to be authorised by a Temporary Event Notice. It is expected that club committee members will seek advice from the Licensing Authority prior to providing such activities for non-members to prevent any unauthorised activities..Where the Licensing Authority identifies that a club no longer meets the conditions set out in section 62 of the Licensing Act 2003 or where the Licensing Authority obtains evidence to demonstrate that a club no longer acts in good faith as a qualifying club, it will give the club a notice withdrawing the club premises certificate.

Suspension of Club Premises Certificates may also occur under section 92A of the LA2003, failure to pay annual fee.

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

Under the Act the Licensing Authority has a duty to promote the licensing objectives, and, a further duty under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in the borough.

The applicant will be expected to detail in their operating schedule how they will prevent crime and disorder on and close to the premises. Such detail should reflect the licensable

activities on offer, location and character of the area, the nature of the premises use and the range of customers likely to use the premises.

These may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Prevention of disorderly conduct and anti-social behaviour
- Prevention of underage drinking
- Prevention of sales of alcohol to intoxicated customers
- Prevention of drunkenness both on and in the vicinity of the premises
- Prevention of drug use and drug dealing
- Restriction to responsible drinks promotions
- Use of safety glass
- Inclusion of a wind-down time following alcohol sales period
- Adequate seating to discourage "vertical drinking"
- The offer of food and snacks or other entertainment or occupation to discourage persistent drinking

In busier premises the Licensing Authority would usually expect to see a short (e.g.30 mins) 'wind down' or 'drinking up' period allowed for after the cessation time of entertainment and alcohol sales as this is effective in assisting in a reduction in noise and exuberance of customers before leaving the premises.

Applicants will be expected to seek advice from the Police and the Licensing Authority will give appropriate weight to requests by the Police for premises to be protected by SIA registered door staff subject to the provision of relevant evidence. Where the Licensing Authority determines after consultation with the police that a premises is one that warrants additional security and monitoring it would expect applicants to include the provision of SIA approved door staff at the premises at appropriate times. Relevant premises are usually those used mainly for drinking alcohol, have later opening hours and are situated within the Town Centre night time economy area.

Where appropriate, applicants for licences in the Town Centre areas providing mainly alcohol, music and dancing would be expected to consider inclusion of a provision of safety glasses to prevent a risk of injury on the rare occasion that a glass may be used as a weapon.

The use of CCTV should be considered where appropriate or on the advice and recommendations of the Police and to a quality and standard approved by the Police for evidential purposes. Licensees will be expected to fully comply with the requirements of the Information Commissioners Office and the Data Protection Act 1998 in respect of any surveillance equipment installed at a premises.

In any application resulting in hearing the sub-committee will consider each application on its individual merits and determine the imposition of conditions that are appropriate to promotion of the licensing objectives.

Promotion of Public Safety

The applicant will be expected to show how the physical safety of persons attending the premises will be protected and to offer any appropriate steps in the operating schedule to promote this.

Such steps will not replace the statutory obligation on the applicant to comply with all relevant legislation under the Health and Safety at Work etc. Act 1973 or under the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2004.

Applicants will be expected to have carried out the necessary risk assessments to ensure safe occupancy levels for the premises. Where a representation from the Fire Authority suggests that for the promotion of the Public Safety objective a maximum occupancy should be applied, the Licensing Authority will consider adding such a limit as a licence condition.

Where appropriate an operating schedule should specify occupancy limits for the following types of licensed premises:

- (i) High Volume Vertical Drinking e.g. premises that provide mainly stand up drinking facilities with limited seating/table space and the primary activity is the sale of alcohol
- (ii) Nightclubs
- (iii) Cinemas
- (iv) Theatres
- (v) Other premises where regulated entertainment is likely to attract a large number of people.
- (vi) Where conditions of occupancy have arisen due to representations received.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

The applicant will be expected to detail any appropriate and proportionate steps to prevent nuisance and disturbance arising from the licensable activities at the premises and from the customers using the premises.

The applicant will be expected to demonstrate that they have considered the following and included steps to prevent public nuisance:

- (i) Proximity of local residents to the premises
- (ii) Licensable activities proposed and customer base
- (iii) Hours and nature of operation
- (iv) Risk and Prevention of noise leakage from the premises from equipment, customers and machinery
- (v) Prevention of noise from customers leaving the premises and customer pick up points outside premises and from the Car Park.
- (vi) Availability of public transport to and from the premises
- (vii) Delivery and collection times and locations
- (viii) Impact of external security or general lighting on residents.
- (ix) History of management of and complaints about the premises.
- (x) Applicant's previous success in preventing Public Nuisance.
- (xi) Outcomes of discussions with the relevant Responsible Authorities.
- (xii) Impact of location, noise and contamination from outside smoking areas on neighbours and other customers
- (xiii) Collection of litter arising from the premises

Steps to prevent public nuisance may include a range of options including noise limiting devices, sound insulation, wind down periods, acoustic lobbies, management of smoking areas etc.

Steps will differ depending on the individual premises and activities and it is for the applicant to ensure that reasonable, effective and appropriate steps are included within the operating schedule.

12. Options

Legal options open to members -

- grant as applied for with conditions consistent with the club operating schedule and mandatory conditions
- 2. grant as above subject to modified conditions as considered appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 3. exclude any qualifying club activity to which the application relates
- 4. or reject the application

Members of the Licensing Act 2003 – Licensing Sub – Committee are reminded of their duty under section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to consider the crime and disorder implications of their decisions and the Licensing Authority's responsibility to co – operate in the reduction of crime and disorder in the Borough

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1988 states:

"Without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those function on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can prevent, crime and disorder in its area".

13 Implications Assessment

The decision should be made with regard to the Secretary of State's Guidance and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy under the Licensing Act 2003. Where the decision departs from either the Guidance or the policy clear and cogent reasons must be given. Members should be aware that if such a departure is made the risk of appeal/challenge is increased.

While all Convention Rights must be considered, those which are of particular relevance to the application are:

- Article 8 Right to respect for private and family life
- Article 1 of the First Protocol Protection of Property
- Article 6(1) Right to Fair Hearing
- Article 10 Freedom of Expression







To Whom It May Concern,

It has come to our attention that a new club premises certificate application has been submitted under reference 18/00977/LACPC relating to the clubhouse for the new Marden Cricket & Hockey Club on Maidstone Road. Whilst we have no objection to a license being granted for these premises, we kindly request standard timings for the provision of music (Live & Recorded) and the serving of alcohol be reduced in line with all other premises certificates in the village and immediate vicinity. The reason for this request is on the grounds of the impact to neighbouring properties from additional noise pollution and excessive drinking hours and subsequent disorderly behaviour it will generate. Our primary concern is the times requested to serve alcohol as standard during the year: 23:59 Mon-Thurs and 02:00 on Saturday nights.

We would urge you to request standard hours be reduced to align to other venues within the village (23:00 Mon-Sun – see overleaf) which would adequately support the premises' primary objective of supporting local sporting events that occur during the day/afternoons. As an alternative, we would support later operating hours by 'special dispensation' up to a maximum of 2-3 per year e.g. Annual Summer Party, Christmas, New Year's Eve etc.

We also wish to raise awareness to the fact there are significant inaccuracies in relation to the impact on the neighbouring properties that have been either deliberately omitted OR falsely represented on the application leading to a potential decision being made without properties and their families fairly considered.

The concerns and inaccuracies with regards to the application are noted below and we would welcome the opportunity to discuss proposed operating hours with the applicants via a consultation process where more Howland Road residents are able to be involved than are currently aware of this application (see below).

ISSUES/CONCERNS

- No attempt made to provide signage and raise awareness on Howland Road in relation to the
 application for the residents to review and raise objections. A number of residents (ourselves
 included) would be directly impacted by the building's license operating hours on the basis of its
 location and proximity. Evidence of how far the sound travels can easily be obtained by witnessing
 existing sporting match noise levels.
- 2. 100% of active licenses for music and the serving of alcohol in the public houses and restaurants in the village and surrounding 5 mile radius all finish at 23:00 for the entire week (including weekends). By considering a 'late license' applicable for the entire year as standard (as opposed to regular hours (and extended hours 'by special request' e.g. New Year's Eve) it will encourage dangerous levels of anti-social behaviour and mass-migration from the pubs upon closing to a venue which is not safely accessible on-foot (see bullet below).

- 3. Both entry/exit points (Maidstone and Howland Road) come out onto unlit residential roads with 40 and 60mph speed-limits respectively with neither exit possessing adequate lighting or pavements to safely transport patrons back into the village on-foot upon closing.
- 4. In the application, it's been stated that there are 'no immediate neighbours' and that the 'entrances/exits do not come out on to residential roads', both of these statements are incorrect. There are two houses within 150m of the premises itself (1) Bluebell Barn and (2) Bumpers Oast PLUS a number of houses <400m at both exits [Exit 1] the main entrance/exit on Maidstone Road] is neighboured by (3) Lamorna and [Exit 2] the public footpath on Howland Road is flanked on both sides by listed buildings (4) Bridgehurst Farmhouse (5) Bridgehurst Oast and (6) Bridgehurst Barn.
- 5. The application claims the club is 'members-only... Not Open to General Public'. The application subsequently contradicts itself by stating 'hirers of these facilities, visiting sports teams and their supporters are considered 'guests of the club' meaning anyone could attend the premises on match days and use the facilities without being a member. This allows events such as weddings to invite guests to use the facilities and thus not retain it's proposed 'members only' environment.
- 6. Alcohol: There has been a request for people to purchase alcohol and consume off-premises.

We would like to comment on the application for this new extended licence to sell alcohol and play music until much later and more frequently than is usual for a Cricket and Hockey Club venue. More usual for a nightclub. We would also like to note that we have had no notification of the intended licence request even though we live in Howland Road and the clubhouse is in clear view from our windows and probably no more than a 100 or so meters away. There is only open space separating us from the clubhouse and any noise coming from there at these sort of hours late at night and early morning will obviously have a major impact on us. We realize that the Club needs to have a bar that will help raise funds. But the request for music and alcohol until 1am Friday and 2am Saturday every week is not acceptable. We understand there is to be a balcony going completely around the outside of the clubhouse, are there to be restrictions to this area late at night? Also is there going to be any noise levels monitored outside the venue? I understand that there are automatic noise sensor equipment that can cut out the music at certain levels that can be fitted. Would there be any responsibility for the club to fit one and at what sound level?

As for the Clubs claim that there are no immediate neighbors I dont agree as we live in a rural enviroment with open space directly around the Clubhouse noise will travel uninterrupted. Currently there are 44 houses being built as close if not closer to the clubhouse than us currently and the purchasers of these houses will not even get to comment on this application and will probably move into their home not having experienced any noise that may be a result of this licence if granted. There will also be noise from people leaving the premises late at night especially over vocal ones that may have slightly over indulged themselves.



There are also application errors regarding impact on neighbouring properties. They state 'there are no immediate neighbours' and 'exits do not come out onto residential roads' – both are factually incorrect. Three properties reside within 150m (Lamorna, Bluebell Barn and Bumpers Oast) and three further properties within 400m (Bridgehurst Barn, Bridgehurst Farmhouse and Bridgehurst Oast). In addition, both entry/exit points (Maidstone and Howland Road) are onto unlit residential roads with neither exit having pavements to return to the village safely.

Finally, I would like to point out that no clear signage was posted on Howland Road regarding the application for residents to review and raise objections.

Dear Lorraine

I am attaching an amended list of hours for our application. As you can see, I have brought forward almost every finishing time.

Just to clarify a couple of other points that have been raised by those commenting:

- 1. There is no boundary between the Club premises and Howland Road. We posted notices at the entrance to the premises on Maidstone Road as required and in the local newspaper.
- 2. As we are a sports club and not a public house, our licensing requirements will be different. We will rely on hiring the clubhouse out for functions to generate income, as I believe is normal practice for any sports club.
- 3. As can be demonstrated by past practice at our previous premises, very late nights are rare. We have run past midnight on one occasion in the last 12 months and we applied for a TENS for that event.
- 4. When the General Committee approves hire of the clubhouse for events, the hirers become our guests. This is written into our rules that were updated in May 2017:

15. Admission to Clubhouse

There may be admitted to the Clubhouse except at such times as the General Committee may direct, and there may be sales of intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises to (1) the guests of members, whose names must be entered in the book kept for this purpose,

- (1) the guests of members, whose names must be entered in the book kept for this purpose but each member is responsible for his or her guest's conduct and behaviour;
- (2) members of visiting teams playing or practising on the premises and their guests and officials;
- (3) persons attending functions on the premises with the approval of the general committee or (in emergency) of the chairman, vice-chairman or secretary or treasurer, to include members and their guests, in accordance with Section 67 of the Licensing Act 2003.

Good Evening Lorraine,

Many thanks for your email and the response from Charlotte.

We continue to remain deeply concerned with the revised timings and impact such a late license creates (specifically the provision of alcohol & recorded music) throughout the week including weekends. As a result we would like to be informed of when a hearing date is to be scheduled for this application to discuss further with the applicants. We also feel that not enough consideration was made to inform residents on Howland Road of this application despite the railway line being between the club's border and the residents.

In terms of a resolve, we stand by our original request of a finish of no later than 23:00hrs 7days a week and remain open to TENS applications as required for special events/weddings etc. It is my understanding you can apply for up to 15x TENS licenses per year which would be ample for a handful of dedicated club events (of which we would fully support) PLUS supplementary income from weddings during the summer months.

I note in Charlotte's response that "in our previous premises, very late nights are rare" and that they "have run past midnight on one occasion in the last 12 months". With the utmost of respect, their previous venue is not remotely comparable to the new building for which they're applying for a license both in terms of facilities& capacity. I do see that in Charlotte's revised application she has requested "we would also like to apply for the following on up to 8 occasions per year, always on a Fri/Sat: (recorded music 01:00, provision of alcohol until 02:00)". With this additional request effectively bypassing a need for TENS licences for 8 events per year we kindly request the primary license remains restricted to 23:00hrs 7 days per week and would support the additional 8x events per year.

HUMAN RIGHTS

Article 8

- 1. Everyone has the right to respect for his private and family life, his home and his correspondence.
- There shall be no interference by a public authority with the exercise of this right except such as is
 in accordance with the law and is necessary in a democratic society in the interests of national
 security, public safety or the economic well-being of the country, for the prevention of disorder or
 crime, for the protection of health or morals, or for the protection of the rights and freedoms of
 others.

Article 1 of the First Protocol

Every natural or legal person is entitled to the peaceful enjoyment of his possessions. No one shall be deprived of his possessions except in the public interest and subject to the conditions provided for by law and by the general principles of international law. The preceding provisions shall not, however, in any way impair the right of a State to enforce such laws as it deems necessary to control the use of property in accordance with the general interest or to secure the payment of taxes or other contributions or penalties.

Article 6(1)

In the determination of his civil rights and obligations or of any criminal charge against him, everyone is entitled to a fair and public hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial tribunal established by law. Judgement shall be pronounced publicly but the press and public may be excluded from all or part of the trial in the interest of morals, public order or national security in a democratic society, where the interests of juveniles or the protection of the private life of the parties so require, or to the extent strictly necessary in the opinion of the court in special circumstances where publicity would prejudice the interests of justice.

Article 10

- 3. Everyone has the right to freedom of expression. This right shall include freedom to hold opinions and to receive and impart information and ideas without interference by public authority and regardless of frontiers. This Article shall not prevent States from requiring the licensing of broadcasting, television or cinema enterprises.
- 4. The exercise of these freedoms, since it carries with it duties and responsibilities, may be subject to such formalities, conditions, restrictions or penalties as are prescribed by law and are necessary in a democratic society, in the interests of national security, territorial integrity or public safety, for the prevention of disorder or crime, for the protection of health or morals, for the protection of the reputation or rights of others, for preventing the disclosure of information received in confidence, or for maintaining the authority and impartiality of the judiciary.
